Exhibitions, Memory and the Future

Memories shape the future, but what happens when community members do not have direct experience with the events of the past? How can exhibitions engage young people in thoughtful explorations of our histories to create more just futures?

In this keynote conversation, **Lebogang Marishane** of Constitution Hill in South Africa and **Amina Krvavac** of the War Childhood Museum in Bosnia and Herzegovina share their strategies, dilemmas, and hopes for creating future memories through exhibitions.

Amina Krvavac is the Executive Director of the War Childhood Museum in Sarajevo, Bosnia and Herzegovina, which focuses on the experiences of children affected by war. Under her leadership, the museum has gained international recognition for its innovative approach to peacebuilding and reconciliation. The War Childhood Museum won the prestigious Council of Europe Museum Prize in 2018. Krvavac believes in museums as spaces for social action, societal healing, and drivers of change, and is particularly interested in unlocking the potential of museums in transitional justice processes.

Lebogang Marishane is a South African researcher and a social justice, culture, and peace-building practitioner, currently serving as the Strategic Support Manager at Constitution Hill in South Africa. With over 15 years of experience, Marishane has been instrumental in advancing truth and reconciliation efforts post-Apartheid. Her work spans transitional justice for African youth to curating exhibitions in post-conflict societies, with a focus on fostering dialogue, reconnecting individuals with their pasts, and envisioning a brighter future for all.

Hillary Spencer, a leader in the conversation about the future of museums, and the co-chair of ICOM Exhibitions, will moderate the session. Spencer is known for her research that focuses on the importance of risk in effective leadership. Committed to models of co-creation and co-leadership in both content creation and structural change, Spencer's work is at the forefront of shaping inclusive and forward-thinking museum practices.

Explore how exhibitions can help create meaningful connections between the past and the future, especially for younger generations who may not have lived through the historical events being presented.

"Hollywood in Riviera" by Promotori Musei Mare connects the glamour of Hollywood's past with modern perspectives, inspiring visitors through its engaging narrative.



How do Exhibitions Shape our Memory?

Museum visitors bring their own life experiences into any exhibition, but how can a museum address the dilemmas of long-held perspectives shaped by colonization, racism, gender, and class? Whose stories are told? Whose memories are honored? How can an understanding of context, agency, and voice help create new meanings and memories in our constantly changing societies?

In this keynote conversation, **Miles Greenwood** of the International Slavery Museum in the United Kingdom and **Olena Honcharuk** of the Oleksandr Dovzhenko National Centre in Ukraine bring diverse perspectives to the exploration of the past, present, and future of reshaping community memory.

The conversation will be moderated by **Linda Norris**, a thought leader at the International Coalition of Sites of Conscience.



Olena Honcharuk is the Acting Director of the Oleksandr Dovzhenko National Centre in Ukraine, the country's primary film archive. Since 2021, she has played a vital role in the organization, particularly in the preservation and promotion of Ukraine's film heritage during challenging times, including the ongoing war. Honcharuk has also led initiatives to expand the Centre's archival activities to document the war and its impacts.

Miles Greenwood is the Lead Curator at the International Slavery Museum, part of National Museums Liverpool. Greenwood's work focuses on addressing the legacies of slavery and empire through exhibitions, research, and community engagement. He has been instrumental in highlighting the historical impact of transatlantic slavery and colonialism, as well as their ongoing effects in contemporary society. Previously, Greenwood served as the Curator of Legacies of Slavery and Empire at Glasgow Museums, where he played a crucial role in reshaping narratives around Glasgow's involvement in the slave trade and its colonial past.

Linda Norris is the Senior Specialist, Methodology and Practice at the International Coalition of Sites of Conscience, the only global network of historic sites, museums, and memory initiatives that connects past struggles to today's movements for human rights. Norris facilitates connections and builds the capacity of members and organizations in using the past to create a more just future. An international thought leader and co-author of *Creativity in Museum Practice*, Norris is known for her work in facilitating conversation and action on how creativity can transform museums, shape more compelling narratives, and foster deeper, more inclusive community connections.

Explore how exhibitions can challenge entrenched narratives, honor diverse memories, and create spaces for new perspectives that resonate with our evolving societies.

Workshop 2 Advancing Digital Innovation in Memory: A Collaborative Workshop

Between 2022 - 2023, 100 international collaborators developed a set of recommendations to support digital innovation in Holocaust museums, memorial sites, libraries, & archives. These guidelines focus on six key themes: Machine Learning and AI; Digitizing Material Evidence; Digital Recording, Remixing, and Recirculating Testimony; Holocaust Memory and Education on Social Media; Virtual Holocaust Memoryscapes; and Gaming and Play in Holocaust Memory and Education.

In this workshop, we invite individuals from the wider GLAM sector to collaborate on advancing these recommendations. Together, we will explore how these guidelines can inform and enhance your practice, particularly when working with historical material that is difficult, sensitive, or traumatic.

11:30 - 11:45 **Presentation 3 Museums as Catalysts for Social Awareness: The Role of The Partition Museum, Delhi**
Abhinav Sharma, Indian Institute of Heritage, India

This presentation will examine the vital role museums play in addressing sensitive social issues, with a focus on The Partition Museum in Delhi, which is dedicated to the 1947 Partition of India. At a time when religious intolerance is a pressing issue in Indian society, museums serve as public platforms that can foster meaningful discussions and help bridge divides. This session will explore how exhibitions and programs can raise awareness of critical issues and

11:45 - 12:00 **Presentation 4 Revolutionizing Cultural Heritage Preservation, Etienne Tellier**, Iconem, France

This session examines how new technologies and digitization are transforming the preservation of cultural heritage sites threatened by wars, conflicts, and climate change. By creating 3D digital twins of these sites, we can safeguard locations where cultures and civilizations once thrived. We'll explore projects like "Eternal Sites" and "Age Old Cities," discussing their role in preserving memory and how they complement traditional museum displays. Discover how technology is reshaping cultural heritage preservation and engagement worldwide.

12:00 - 12:15 **Presentation 5 Tokens of Power**
Ken Ird, University of Tartu Museum, Estonia

In January 2025, a new exhibition, "Tokens of Power. Political Image of the Assembly Hall of the University of Tartu", will open at the Art Museum of the University of Tartu. This exhibition will provide a novel insight into that iconic neoclassical public space and analyse it as an ideologically (un)conscious stage for different political systems that governed Estonia in the 19th and 20th centuries. The presentation discusses challenges faced during the preparation of the exhibition and focuses on how to deal with politically sensitive history.

12:15 - 12:30 **Presentation 6 Reshaping Memory**
Kosjenka Laszlo Klemar, Technical Museum Nikola Tesla, Croatia

This presentation examines the crucial role museums play in preserving or erasing collective memory, focusing on the Nada Dimić File 2023 exhibition at the Technical Museum Nikola Tesla. The session will discuss museums' responsibilities in managing dissonant and complex heritage, offering strategies for engaging audiences in reshaping erased memory. Attendees will gain insights into creating environments that encourage critical reflection.

12:30 - 12:45 **Presentation 7 Beyond the Frame: Charting the Spectrum of Preferences Between Digital and Traditional Museum Exhibitions**
Zhi Ye, Kings College London, United Kingdom

This session examines how international audiences engage with digital technologies in blockbuster exhibitions, based on insights from over 30 semi-structured interviews. It explores how diverse audience groups interact with and perceive traditional, digital, immersive, and online exhibition formats. The findings highlight how digital elements can both enhance and detract from the overall experience. Drawing from these insights, the session will propose guidelines for designing more effective and inclusive digital exhibition experiences that cater to a wide range of international visitors.

Pia Hansson, Pia Hansson InredningsArkitekt SIR, Sweden

Discover the magic of Vårgårda Museum, where a community's collective memory comes alive in a 140-square-meter exhibition. This small Swedish museum tells 10,000 years of history—from the Bronze Age to modern times—using innovative design on a limited budget. The exhibition's focus on roads, intersections, and trade routes creates a powerful sense of belonging, connecting visitors to the past through interactive experiences, compelling narratives, and immersive environments.




Exhibitions, Memories, and Indigenous Communities

Historically, exhibitions about Indigenous communities were often developed without their involvement, perpetuating legacies of colonialism and displacement. Today, Indigenous museum leaders are reshaping the exhibition process, introducing perspectives that challenge conventional practices. This keynote presentation will explore how Indigenous memories, traditions, and contemporary experiences can be honored and integrated into exhibitions, creating spaces that respect these cultures while fostering inclusive learning experiences for all. The conversation will spotlight museum leaders who are driving change by centering Indigenous voices and embracing diverse ways of knowing.

Taina Máret Pieski, Director of the Sámi Museum Siida in Inari, Finland. The Indigenous-led museum serves as both a cultural and nature center, focusing on the culture and history of the Sámi people, as well as the natural environment of Northern Lapland. Under Pieski's leadership, the museum has undergone significant renovations and expansions, enhancing its exhibitions and facilities to better serve the Sámi people and preserve Sámi heritage. The Sámi Museum Siida is the winner of the European Museum of the Year Award (EMYA) 2024.

Chris Newell, a member of the Passamaquoddy Tribe, has made significant contributions to the museum field, particularly in promoting Indigenous perspectives. Newell served as the Executive Director and Senior Partner to the Wabanaki Nations at the Abbe Museum in Bar Harbor, Maine. He was the first tribal member to lead the museum, which is dedicated to Wabanaki art, history, and culture. During his tenure, Newell focused on decolonizing museum practices by centering Native voices and restructuring the museum's board to include a majority of Wabanaki members. Newell is also the co-founder of the Akomawt Educational Initiative, which aims to improve education on Native history and contemporary issues across New England.

Moderated by **Margaret Middleton**, an American independent exhibit designer and museum consultant based in the United Kingdom with over 15 years of experience in the museum field. Working at the intersection of design and social justice, Middleton focuses on creating inclusive and welcoming museum experiences for diverse audiences.

Join us for this impactful session to gain insights into the evolving role of Indigenous communities in shaping exhibitions and discover ways we can all contribute to this vital shift in museum practice.


